To continue, even though our March event at MTA does not have a registration fee, you may incur the cost of a motel room. The reason being is that because the site is so compact, we are not able to set up our normal company street. Normally the unit will stay at the Rodeway Inn, which is located just outside of Historic Williamsburg and then drive in for each day; see contact information below.

Staff Ride – "Retracing the Steps of the Buff Sticks" - Fredericksburg, VA

12 December 2020

On Saturday the 12th of December, both our Military and Civilian members came together for our official event for December. Initially starting at Chatham Manor, situated on a bluff overlooking the City of Fredericksburg, VA and then afterwards at my home on the reverse slope of Lee's Hill. By both driving to certain points and then walking key areas, those who participated were able to retrace the steps of the

original soldiers who earned the title of being addressed as **Buff Sticks**. Conducting this activity 158 years afterwards, almost to the exact date and day, we first looked over the City while discussing the battle and then continued at the northern crossing site. From there, walking street-by-street, we used both the books of modern noted authors and after action reports of the officers who commanded during the battle itself to help orientate ourselves through the streets of the city and its original western boundary.

That being said and speaking just for myself, some moments that really stuck with me at the end of my last event to command on that Saturday afternoon were as follows: First, All the research that I was able to do before arriving at Chatham Manor. A huge thank you goes out to NPS Ranger Peter Maugle for all of his assistance. While walking, it was great to note the almost perfect historically correct weather that we had for that day. Next was meeting our newest member's grandfather and catching up with our older members who I had not seen in a long while. From there it was the simple act of being able to walk in the footsteps of the original Regulars, while seeing how drastically the terrain changed, street by street. Reading aloud the original reports from Cpt. Wilkens (*Regiment*), Lt. Col. Buchanan (*Brigade*), and Brigadier Gen. Sykes (*Division*) at the different locations on the battlefield, and in some cases, where the action itself originally took place. Reading from the reports of the other Regimental Commanders and Brigade reports from 2nd and 3rd Brigade and how our Regiment kept getting mentioned over and over again in a positive light. Handing out the Soldiers Gifts to all who participated and of course the unexpected but greatly appreciated thank you gift that I received from the Company for my time as your Commander. Before heading home, I was able to stop by the Fredericksburg Battlefield Museum and personally thank both NPS Rangers, Peter Maugle and Ryan Quint. Finally, was talking long into the night afterwards with everyone who was able to come to my home.

I am sure that I missed other occurrences, but that is why this is a membership article, as we all had different experiences. I now would invite you to continue reading what the other Buff Stick's experienced at this event. – *1ST Lieutenant, (and soon to be Happy Private) Paul Stier*

After Action - Fredericksburg Walking Tour

- Camaraderie building event. As new fish, great to experience with different members and getting to know unit.

- Well researched and rehearsed. Enough compliments cannot be expressed to the Commander for his research and rehearsed walking routes. Blended in soldier's experiences with overall tactical positioning. Stopping points were carefully selected as in to enhance experience without fighting public/surroundings.

- Offer to host unit members at Commander's residence. While we did not avail ourselves of this generous offer, the invite was sincerely appreciated.

- Starting point was ideal.

- Stressing to gain overall strategic awareness before the tour and then stressing the limited tactical awareness the unit / soldiers really had during the fight. – *Private Stanley Adamus*

Another great event made better by the chance to be with like-minded friends and especially enhanced by Paul's [*Lt. Stier's*] expert battlefield guiding - he ought to do it for a living. Personally, I enjoyed walking in the footsteps of my great-great-grandfather who was also in the 5th Corps and made the crossing just behind the Buffsticks and basically followed the same route to the battlefield. I even recall Paul's reference to the Buffsticks coordination with Humphrey's Brigade in which my great-great-grandfather served. Loved every minute of our tour. – *Corporal Craig Ross*

I'll second all of the above. Events like this, in which we learn about the actual history of the unit and go beyond the clothing and gear, is what sets us apart. And like Craig [*Cpl. Ross*], being able to walk the ground on which the actual 3rd US veterans fought gives a perspective that cannot be matched. Thanks to Paul [*Lt. Stier*] for doing the research and leading a meaningful, valuable learning experience for us. – *Private David Welker*

I think it was Winston Churchill who shared the sentiment that if you wanted to understand a battle, you need to walk the terrain. Reading the reports and standing at the site with the writer's view, you gain a different perspective and an appreciation of the report's visual context. Paul did an excellent job of leading us along the path of the 3rd US in December 1862. I appreciate the research effort to conduct a tour like this for our group effectively. Paul's knowledge of the battle in general and the town itself allowed him to direct us to the key points. He orientated us with historic and modern maps to understand context while reading various battle reports. I am glad I made the last-minute decision to attend, and the weather was top shelf.

Period Correct Receipts

Soldiers and Civilians of the Buffstick's, the below is a period correct receipt that you can make and use for years to come. Now that our unit should be back in Garrison, the opportunity to make this receipt becomes more realistic.

“*Stollen*”, a German holiday treat

A traditional cake in our family was Stollen. A family friend brought it every year to our feast. Knowing the dangers of “*traditional*”, I went looking back through the period cookbooks to trace the recipes for stollen in English. I first found a recipe from 1889 actually termed “*Stollen*.”

From: *Aunt Babette's Cook Book* by “*Aunt Babette*”, 1889

Stollen

Sift two pounds of flour into a bowl and set a sponge in it with two cents' worth of compressed yeast, a teaspoonful of salt, a pint of lukewarm milk and a tablespoonful of sugar. When this has risen, add half a pound of creamed butter, a quarter of a pound of seeded raisins and one quarter of a pound of sugar, yolks of four eggs, four ounces of powdered almonds and the grated peel of a lemon. Work all well, beating with the hands, not kneading. Let this dough rise at least three hours, then form into one or two long loaves, narrower at the end, like a stollen. Brush the top with melted butter and bake over half an hour in a moderate oven.

Then I finally found a yeast cake with fruit and nuts that closely resembled stollen, but was termed fruit cake. I had to try my hand, and of course, add my own flourishes.

Fruit Cake Without Eggs

Two pounds of flour.

One and three quarter pounds of sugar.

One pint of milk.

Half a pound of butter.

Half a teaspoonful of salt.

One and a half teaspoonfuls of soda, or saleratus, or two of sal volatile, dissolved in a little hot water.

One nutmeg, one pound of raisins, and one wine glass of brandy. This makes three loaves.

Warm the milk, and add the butter and salt to it. Work the butter and sugar to a cream, and then add the milk, then the flour, then the saleratus, and lastly the spice and fruit.

What I Did:

Warm the milk, butter, and salt.

Add sugar and whip to a cream.

Combine the baking soda and flour.

Add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients and mix well.

Add raisins, citrus peel, and almond slivers.

Form into loaves and bake.

While still warm, brush with egg white and dredge in confectioner's sugar.

Yield: 12-24 Servings, or one hungry Private
